PASTOR'S LETTER

Dear LCPC Family and Friends,

As the beautiful season of autumn deepens and we approach Thanksgiving, my heart is filled with gratitude for the incredible ways God is moving among us. I am writing to you today to invite you to prayerfully consider your commitment to our church's ministry in 2026.

Stewardship & Vision Sunday

On Sunday, November 16th, we will gather for our annual Stewardship & Vision Sunday, a time to focus on our calling as stewards of God's abundant blessings. This day is not just about our church budget, but a time for us to reflect on the joy of giving and how we can all play a vital part in the work of God's kingdom.

Blessed to Be a Blessing

Our theme this year is "Blessed to Be a Blessing," drawn from Genesis 12. "I will bless you," God says to Abraham, "and you will be a blessing... and all peoples on earth will be blessed through you" Genesis 12:1-3. The foundational principle remains true for us today: We are blessed to be a blessing! These gifts God entrusts to us—including spiritual gifts, talents, and resources—are meant to flow through believers to grow the Kingdom of Christ; not to be hoarded but to be shared, ultimately bringing glory to God and fostering compassionate actions in the world.

The Heart of a Cheerful Giver

In 2 Corinthians 9:7, the Apostle Paul reminds us that "God loves a cheerful giver." The word translated as "cheerful" comes from the Greek word hilaros, from which we get our word "hilarious". True giving is a joyful and willing act of the heart, not an obligation. This

joyful generosity is a hallmark of a life lived in Christ, where we recognize that all we have—our time, talents, and resources—are gifts from God. When we give with a willing heart, we participate in God's generous nature. We are reminded of the Macedonian churches in 2 Corinthians 8, who, out of their extreme poverty, pleaded for the privilege of sharing in the service to others, their overflowing joy leading to rich generosity. Their example shows that giving with joy is not dependent on our wealth but on our spirit.

Engaging in the Work of the Kingdom

Engaging in the work of the kingdom matters because we are called to be God's "fellow workers" (1 Corinthians 3:9). The kingdom of God isn't a distant future event, but a present reality that we are invited to participate in today. This work is not limited to those in ministry; it is for every believer. Whether in your home, at your workplace, or in your community, your daily work can be an act of worship that points others to God. As ambassadors for Christ, our actions are a visible sign of God's renewing work in the world. When we live with integrity, serve with humility, and love our neighbors, we show the watching world a glimpse of the kingdom to come. This is how we fulfill our purpose—not to earn our salvation, but to participate joyfully in the mission God has already set in motion.

Engaging in the work of the kingdom is not just a duty; it is a profound privilege. When we work together, we create a tangible witness to God's love in the world. As I look around LCPC, I see glimpses of this hope all around us: a hunger and thirst for God's Word, a grow-



ing spirit of service, a growing intercultural and intergenerational community, a growing children and youth ministry, a warm welcome that extends to visitors each week, and so much more. These are just a few examples of how we are collectively working together to advance God's kingdom right here, right now.

Your pledge is vital for helping us prayerfully and responsibly plan our ministry for the coming year. The Sunland resident has helped with fire recovery in Altadena and also delivered groceries to neighbors in need as part of LCPC's Making It Happen ministry. As a Deacon, he serves the congregation in a multitude of ways, including driving folks to doctor appointments and, this fall, joining a team of bakers in the Koopmans kitchen to make apple spice cake for the entire congregation.

"Doing all of that baking, it's the first time I've done that," he said. "It was out of my comfort zone, but I thoroughly enjoyed it."

Both Bill and Madeline have high-energy personalities that make it easy to connect with those around them. Madeline works full-time in the demanding position of Director of Medical Staff Services at Children's Hospital Los Angeles, but is quick to volunteer to help those in need, at LCPC and beyond.

You may have seen her entering church with large shopping bags filled to the brim. Peek inside and you'll find beautiful scarves that Madeline knit for "comfort care kits" for U.S. veterans, at the request of Isabel Adams

on behalf of the Burbank Elks Club.

"They were handing out warm caps and those long scarves to keep the veterans warm, as some of them spend the night on the street," Madeline says. "I think we've done about 250 scarves for them. They finally got to the point where they said, I think we have enough now for this year."

Madeline has the gift of hospitality, hosting dinners for friends as well as colleagues in the medical profession. Years ago, when she opened her home for a Thanksgiving celebration, she invited her go-to florist from Pasadena. He said he usually spent the holiday with his brother, so she said, "Invite him to come along!"

The brother was Bill. The two met, developed a friendship and learned they had much in common.

Born in Mississippi, Madeline lived all over the country during her long career as a hospital administrator before settling in La Crescenta. Bill was born and raised in Illinois, then joined the Army at age 21. After serving in Seoul, South Korea, with the Armed Forces Radio and Television Service, he entered the field of broadcasting, eventually moving to Los Angeles to work in post-production for television and film. Both love to travel, on international excursions and to visit family.

Each of them was raised in a household with different religious backgrounds — Southern Baptist and Methodist for Madeline, and Episcopalian and Christian Science for Bill. But both of their families came to embrace the Presbyterian Church.

And they each have a deep love of music that dates back to their high school days, when Bill was a drum major who played the trumpet and Madeline a drum majorette who played flute and classical piano.

LCPC's classical service is a weekly blessing, they say. They're grateful for the moving worship experience created by director Gary Woodward, the Cathedral Choir and the exceptionally talented pianist Matthew Krell.

"The music is really beautiful, and I like the idea that our ancestors were singing these same hymns, and a lot of us remember our parents and grandparents in their churches singing the same music," Madeline says. "It's a point of connectivity and familiarity and comfort. And it speaks to an awful lot of church history and growth."

is 101 years young, joined us-proving you're never too old to learn to paint! Thank you so much Cindy! We can't wait to do this again and we might even invite the men of the church next time.



JENNY

Jenny was introduced to us through a friend's family. After undergoing a divorce and raising two children, she began to feel depressed. She started joining our Bible time every week with her daughter and felt the Lord's love ministering to her heart. She began attending every week, daily praying for the Lord's help and encouragement to sustain her through this difficult time. Then, just a few weeks ago, her son, who struggled with depression and never wanted to join our fellowship, came with his mom and sister. He enjoyed the time so much, he has been coming ever since.

BRUCE AND ZOE

We met Bruce almost a year ago through an English Corner activity. He was interested in spiritual things, especially Tibetan Buddhism and Christianity. Later he told Henry that he almost decided to go to a monastery in Tibet to become a monk there. When Bruce initially came to study the Word with us, his parents dropped him off near our apartment, asking, "What are you going to do there?" "I'm going to study the Bible," he replied. His mom told him it was a waste of time to do such things, saving that he would do better to trust in himself. But, after coming to know more about Christ, Bruce knew otherwise. He sensed that there was more to life. And he could feel that the anger inside of him, tearing at his soul, was going to destroy him if he didn't do something about it. For too long, Bruce had been angry at society and the various injustices he had witnessed through the years. Now, he knew, he needed healing. He needed peace deep down in his inmost being. And, through Jesus Christ, he was experiencing it. He memorized the fruit of the Spirit (Gal 5:22-23) and recognized Father working on his soul. And as time went on, transformation began to happen. Later, Bruce brought his wife and son to church. And, because of the change they saw happening in Bruce, they have become more open to knowing Him.

JETHRO'S FAMILY

Jethro came to faith at our MY City fellowship more than ten years ago. He is now married to Grace and has two kids. They've been serving on the field for around five years. After taking a summer furlough, they're preparing to return to the Middle East.

WASHINGTON

Washington has been faithful in reading his Bible and writing notes in it as well. He has also has posted several scriptures in his personal social media account. He told us, "I plan to dedicate the next two years to studying the Word thoroughly so that I can be equipped to teach the Word in the future." (2 Tim 3:16)
