SPOTLIGHT: ARPY JAHJAH

For as long as she can remember, Arpy Jahjah has drawn energy and inspiration from being in the presence of children.

As a young girl, she was the go-to babysitter in her neighborhood, and when her middle school sought volunteers to help out first-graders at the elementary school next door, she was quick to put up her hand.

"I love the child's brain. When kids ask a lot of questions, I get excited because that questioning makes us see things in a way that adults usually don't," says Arpy, who's overjoyed that she gets a daily dose of kids' curiosity as the executive director of the Center for Children at La Crescenta Presbyterian.

"Every morning, when that first child walks in, it's like my first cup of coffee. It's exciting to me, it starts my day off right."

Arpy taught preschool during her college years, became a kindergarten teacher soon after graduation, and served as an administrator in both public and private schools settings. But her life and career have also taken unexpected turns that, in retrospect, prepared her well for leading CFC, the church's most prominent local ministry.

It's something of a family tradition, she said, recalling her father's willingness to go wherever God was calling him.

Raised in Lebanon, Missak Tatoulian moved to Chicago in the 1960s and built a career as a photographer, even taking team photos for

MLB's White Sox. After marrying Arpy's mother, Araxy, who was from the same hometown in Lebanon, the couple decided Chicago winters were just too hard to take and they relocated to Pasadena.

There, they opened a restaurant, the Flaming Skewer on Lake Avenue. "My dad was not a chef and my mom was more of an intellect who had never fried an egg," says Arpy, but with a little training and a lot of determination, they turned the eatery into a success.

But God had other plans in store for the family. Arpy's father was prominent in the Pasadena community and a deacon at St. Gregory's Armenian Apostolic

EATON FIRE RECOVERY TASK FORCE UPDATE

Recap of 2025 Activity:

- Total contributions to the Eaton Fire Recovery Fund totaled nearly \$190,000, including matching grants and about \$28,000 in transfers from other LCPC mission accounts, as well as accrued interest on the fund.
- We expect to distribute the vast majority of this fund by the end of 2026. So far, we have distributed about \$46,000, with about two-thirds of that going to Door of Hope ("DOH"), and the balance to San Gabriel Valley Habitat for Humanity ("Habitat"). We expect the proportion of our giving to these two organizations will shift in the coming year as Habitat building accelerates and DOH's support specifically targeted to victims of the fire begins to wind down. We also still plan to financially support at least one other Christ-centered organization doing highly effective work in response to the fire, but have not selected that organization.
- Not long after the fire was extinguished, a small group of LCPC members and friends volunteered through Samaritan's Purse to assist about 45 families as they searched through the ashes of their homes, looking for special possessions that might have

survived the fire.

- We have participated in three Habitat building events so far. On December 13, we participated in our first multi-church, Community Coalition build day (following the postponement of our November 15 event due to heavy rain). Working together with folks from La Canada Presbyterian and other churches, we installed siding, removed a soffit, added fresh paint, and filled the Wood family's future home with handwritten messages of hope and encouragement. Similar build days will be scheduled throughout 2026, with our first one taking place on January 31. - other school supplies, along with over \$1,000 in cash donations, all of which was matched with money from our Eaton Fire Fund to support kids in the DOH program who were directly impacted by the fire.
- Small teams helped to furnish homes for three DOH families, delivering items from the families' wish lists and sharing a meal with them.
 - We hosted a heavily trafficked booth at DOH's annual Christmas festival in Pasadena (pictured). We welcomed kids and their parents with a lively ping pong toss game (complete with cool prizes) and crafts, which included making small, no-sew fleece pillows and ornaments. Using one of the church vans, we also provided a shuttle service between

an off-site parking lot and Maranatha High School, where the event took place. Hundreds of DOH kids participated at this year's event (both those currently in DOH programs, as well as alumnae); the event was a huge success, and one we now anticipate supporting annually.

- We have been delivering meals once a month to one of the DOH multi-family shelters.

Church. But he decided to travel to Jerusalem for a full year of monastic study, with Araxy staying behind to manage the restaurant and care for their baby — Arpy's older brother.

"My father told me the story of this very intense calling, how he couldn't shake the feeling. How he decided to become a priest," Arpy recalls.

Upon his return, Missak Tatoulis was ordained in Reedley, in California's Central Valley, where Arpy was born and spent the first 15 years

of her life. Upon ordination, Missak was given the name Fr. Datev after an Armenian Monastery dating back to 895 AD.

"Reedley is a sweet little farming town, and in many ways it reminds me of LCPC — the community feel, even the church hall," Arpy says. "When the Cruisers gather in Koopmans, it's that same kind of community."

Her father went on to continue his ministry in San Diego, where Arpy went to high school before continuing her education at community college, Long Beach State and eventually Pacific Oaks College, studying early childhood education and human development.

But like her father, Arpy had the sense that she had other talents she was meant to explore. She had always had a mind for business and even considered changing her major, but her father, always her biggest champion, encouraged her to finish what she started — but leave herself open to learning new things later in life.

That guidance played out after she met her husband, Roger Jahjah, who was at the time in the luxury goods sector. Roger learned of an opportunity that Arpy would be perfect for, and she pivoted from education to marketing, working for elite brands like Gucci, Swatch and Cartier and

building expertise in event coordination, visual displays and training teams.

These skills would serve her well when she eventually went back to her first love, creating a healthy and nurturing space for children. She became the preschool director at St. Gregory Hovsepian School, then served as a community liaison for Pasadena Unified’s Daniel Webster Elementary. She loved the work but eventually realized that a public school setting put boundaries on the ways she could help families.

“Every time I talked to parents and children, I couldn’t bring the God factor into it, the spirituality into it. You can’t, it’s not allowed,” she says. “And that felt very restrictive because how can I guide you in life if I can’t share God’s love?”

She knew her father was always praying that she would let God take control, and she kept this in her heart after his passing in early 2024. So she felt it was a sign from on high when she opened

her inbox one day and saw an email from her old friend Peggy Bedevian, who worshipped at both St. Gregory’s and LCPC. Peggy had forwarded the job description from CFC, posted after Pat Chambers announced her plans to retire as director after nearly three decades of service.

Arpy decided the time was right for a change. She applied, and her first interview was scheduled for January 10, 2025. That was three days after the Eaton Fire broke out, sweeping through Altadena — and severely damaging the loving home she and Roger built for their three children and Arpy’s mother. The family had to relocate but Arpy let the CFC hiring team know that she wanted to move forward with the interview.

“I had been praying for this for so long,” she said. “Before my father passed away, he was a really big part of me moving along. I guess I’m a lot like my dad, I’m on this journey.”

Arpy was welcomed onto the LCPC staff in April. She has since jumped into traditions such as Vacation Bible School, where her kids Vem, 16, and 14-year old twins Nishan and Teni, joined

the team of volunteers, and conducted a months-long search for an assistant director — all while living in an RV and ADU during repairs to her fire-damaged home. Thankfully, the family was able to move back in before Christmas.

In the coming year, Arpy has visions of bringing the families in our community even closer together. She would love to launch a faith-based class, something akin to “Mommy and Me” but open to all kinds of caretakers and guardians. Another goal is bringing the dads of CFC together in a Fathers Club that could strengthen their bonds and tap into their ingenuity for school projects, fundraisers and more.

Arpy says that from the time she was in her mother’s womb, “God first” has been her guiding light, and she’s eager to live that out at CFC.
