PASTOR'S LETTER

Greetings, La Crescenta Presbyterian Church Family & Friends.

On Ash Wednesday, we have begun our 40-day journey in the wilderness during this Lenten Season. Our Lenten journey continues through the glorious day of Easter Sunday.

As I pointed out in March Messenger issue, the Season of Lent is a time to refresh, reflect, repent, and renew our commitment to follow Jesus. It's a time to seek pardon for our sinfulness and starting a new and clean slate in our relationship with God. It's a time to focus on and not lose sight of the Savior, the deliverer, who delivers us from any form of temptation, Jesus Christ.

Traditionally, the Season of Lent is also known as a "season of sacrifice." People "sacrifice" and give up that which they feel they cannot live without such as a certain food, dessert, or social media. Have you ever thought about the joy in sacrifice that Lent provides? Most of us don't delight in sacrifice; in fact, in our daily lives, we often do our best to avoid challenges and practices that push us outside of our comfort zones.

In Christianity, there is a beautiful irony be-

tween joy and sacrifice, and we are presented with a wonderful opportunity to embrace this uniquely during Lent. Lent is a fitting time to "detach" ourselves from the deceiving world, and "attach" ourselves to Christ. In intentionally choosing this, we are saying "no" to things in order to get into the practice of saying "no" when inclined towards sin, ultimately deepening our faith and our relationship with the Lord.

Victory can be found when we deny ourselves and pick up our crosses and hardships in order to grow closer to Christ! Therein lies the joy. When we grow closer to God by denying our will, we say "yes" to a life of abundance with God through Christ. Our God is a benevolent God; He will not hold back His grace from those who honor Him and choose challenging things to grow and give Him glory. Without question, Lent provides us an opportunity to make God a greater part of our life, and to take our faith to new levels.

Lent is a time for every one of us to do more than simply deny ourselves and our desires; we need to welcome God into our lives in greater ways so that when we get to Holy Week and Easter, we have an even greater appreciation for the sacrifice the Lord made for us. Talk about pure joy!

In this series, we will be learning together where to find strength for the journey. (2) PEAK Spring Classes: Two classes that would help us in this process of spiritual formation. Marriage Through Christ – Growing Deeper, led by Jamie Given, and *Jesus and the New Testament World*, a one-of-a kind Bible class that I will lead. This class examines the world of the News Testament religiously, politically, socially, and culturally for a better understanding of the Scriptures. (3) Holy Week at LCPC: This is going to be another wonderful opportunity to center ourselves on Christ. There will be services on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and two worship opportunities on Easter.

And as we continue to navigate this journey, do not despair. God always has the last word. Just look at the Easter event! On Good Friday the world of darkness had thrown everything it had on the Anointed One, the Messiah and buried Him in a tomb – thinking it had the final word. But the final word belonged to God. On Easter Sunday God overturned the world's verdict, as our Savior Jesus Christ rose from that tomb and conquered the darkness of the world forever. May you and our faith family of LCPC, along with all of our loved ones, have a Christ-centered Lent and a most blessed and Happy Easter!

EATON FIRE RECOVERY FUND UPDATE

To all of you who have already contributed to this fundraiser, thank you! We just need a little more push to get us to our goal of raising \$75,000 by Easter Sunday (April 20); all donations received by then will be doubled by a matching grant (up to \$75,000). As of March 25, we've raised \$46,513 before the benefit of the matching grant. Please spread the word, especially among your neighbors, friends, and co-workers who aren't a part of the LCPC family.

Or consider conducting your own event or outreach on behalf of our neighbors who lost everything in this disaster. We know time is running short, so if you want to plan your own event to benefit our Recovery Fund but can't get it done by Easter, just let us know – we will extend the benefit of the matching grant to events that take place after Easter, so long as we know about them in advance.

All the money we raise will support Christian organizations already on the ground serving the most economically vulnerable victims of the fire. The Task Force has been carefully vetting potential partners, meeting with representatives of the organizations who made it to our "short list", and researching a wide range of considerations as part of our selection process. We are happy to announce that we've already selected two of our future partners: Door of Hope and the San Gabriel Valley chapter of Habitat for Humanity. At least one additional mission partner will be added to our roster in the coming months. For a glimpse at how we will partner with these organizations, read on!

DOOR OF HOPE

In the wake of the Eaton Fire. Door of Hope took swift action launching the Eaton Fire Housing Assistance Program to provide immediate relief and long-term housing stability to 150 low-income families with nowhere else to turn. As a Christian nonprofit housing provider located just a few miles from the fire's epicenter, Door of Hope has spent nearly 40 years helping families facing homelessness through three holistic programs: Transitional Housing, Homelessness Prevention, and Alumni Services. They understand the fear and uncertainty of losing a home, and have the tools and experience to help families find safe, affordable housing as quickly as possible.

The Eaton Fire Housing Assistance Program is providing families with:

- Transitional shelter (pictured below) for those with nowhere to go
- Case management to help them rebuild their lives
- Financial assistance to cover unmet housing needs
- Housing navigation services to secure long-term solutions
- Furniture for their new homes (facilitated by Door of Hope's partnership with The Change Reaction)

In addition to providing financial support to Door of Hope's Housing Assistance Program, LCPC has already committed to walking alongside at least one family who lost their home in the fire, as they transition into new housing. We may not be matched with our family (or families) for a few more months, but once we are, and when the family has started their housing search (with the help of their case manager), we will receive a brief bio and housewares "wish list" from them, much like a wedding registry. We will purchase at least \$1,000 worth of goods on their wish list, and bring



know what a joy it is to work alongside a family making their dream of home ownership a reality!

Seeking to put God's love into action, Habitat for Humanity brings people together to build homes, communities and hope. The San Gabriel chapter was started in 1990. Since then, they have built nearly 100 homes in northeast Los Angeles county, and completed close to 130 home preservation (major renovation) projects for families for whom such improvements were financially out of reach. Check out some of their past projects here: <u>SGV Habitat</u>

Projects

Under their "Framing The Future" campaign, SGV Habitat seeks to change the lives of 200 families over three years (2024-2026), through affordable home ownership and home preservation. To this end, the organization recently acquired six houses that had been in the original path of the 710 freeway (purchased by Caltrans back in the 70s under threat of eminent domain), with a mandate to

build affordable housing on the sites. With renovation, these six houses will become eight homes, all of which have been earmarked for residents of Altadena who lost theirs in the fire. There are another four units in Pasadena awaiting renovation (and the addition of two more units), which have also been set aside for Altadena families. Additional land for new construction in Altadena is expected to be acquired in the near future.

Habitat has already identified 18 families who lost their homes in the fire and who would qualify for assistance through one of their builds. New constructions are expected to start in the next six months to a year, possibly even sooner.

Of course, this kind of transformation doesn't come cheap. New construction of one of these homes would likely cost more than \$400,000, with a major renovation running about half that. Habitat works to build partnerships with churches, other organizations, and individuals to creatively finance these projects and facilitate affordable mortgages (30% of their gross monthly income) for the families they serve. In addition to paying their mortgage, all household members 18 years and older are required to participate in the building of their home through some form of "sweat equity", working alongside community volunteers for a minimum of 250 hours per household. This kind of investment pays off for both the family and the program, with zero SGV Habitat homeowners facing foreclosure since the inception of this program.

As of this writing, we are in the early stages of determining exactly how we will partner with SGV Habitat. Our hope is that in partnership with a few other churches, we would be able to sponsor the construction (or major renovation) of one of the sites identified above.

Hello, friends and families of LCPC!

Of the four seasonal shifts we experience each year, I think spring might be the most representative of our life in Christ, both individually and collectively; the cold, bitter, barren winter (please bear with me for the sake of the illustration; we all know that California winters can hardly be described as bitter!) gives way to sunlight, warmth, and new life.
